1. Illegal or improper activities:

No intelligence activity has been identified which is reasonably believed to be illegal or contrary to Executive Order of Department of Defense instructions concerned with intelligence oversight.

- 2. Significant Intelligence Oversight activities:
- a. SJFHQ determined that 84% of their personnel in intelligence related positions have completed intelligence oversight refresher training. The remaining 16% have been identified and a training plan is in place to have them appropriately trained by the end of the quarter.
- b. J9 identified an intelligence oversight concern in the Noble Resolve and Unified Quest exercises that involves the storage, sharing and modeling of U.S. citizens, corporations, assets and infrastructure, for DoD purposes. These concerns were addressed with the J9 legal advisor, Daniel Donovan, as a legal and training issue for DoD participation in these exercises. Mr. Donovan provided legal guidance and training based on the exercise requirements to the J9 planners and participants to insure compliance with all appropriate regulations.
- 3. Results of Intelligence Oversight Inspections:
- a. The USJFCOM Inspector General's Office conducted a unit command inspection of the Joint Communication Support Element (JCSE) in Tampa, Florida from 30 October to 3 November 2006 that included intelligence oversight. The intelligence oversight officer, Mr. Quinton Gordon, was in compliance with all appropriate regulation and maintained accurate training records for the command's intelligence oversight program.

Illegal or Improper Activities:

No intelligence activity has been identified which is reasonably believed to be illegal or contrary to Executive Order or Department of Defense directives concerned with Intelligence Oversight for USNORTHCOM or its subordinate joint commands.

- 2. Significant Intelligence Oversight Activities:
- a. The N-NC IG completed Intelligence Oversight Inspections of SJFHQ-N and the N-NC J2. Both organizations were well versed in their duties and responsibilities, understanding constitutional constraints, and the laws and directives which govern the collection, dissemination and storage of sensitive information, especially that data which is constrained by Intelligence Oversight guidance or acquired on non-DoD persons. Their programs are very strong, with only minor recommendations for improvement.

The re-inspection of JFHQ-NCR/MDW was also conducted during this quarter. Good accountability and integration of Law Enforcement Sensitive (LES) and other U.S. Persons information was demonstrated throughout the re-inspection. The confusion and misunderstanding of the requirements and constraints involved in the storage, marking, and fusion of U.S. Persons information displayed during the last inspection (Aug 06) was no longer present. It was apparent that a good awareness of the legal constraints involved in IO/Sensitive Data permeated the command, and that a locused training regimen was being conducted on a frequent basis.

b. Training: All N-NC Intelligence Directorates and subordinate commands have conducted initial and refresher training for personnel. The percentage of personnel trained in the command is currently 100%, and all efforts will be made to maintain this level.

Changes to IO Program:

All N-NC Intelligence Directorates and subordinate commands have implemented more frequent database information review processes (30-60 day reviews) to ensure data repositories have effective follow-up assessments concerning the need to retain various forms of information.

4. Significant Intelligence Oversight policy changes:

N-NC Instruction 14-103 (Intelligence Oversight) revision currently in staffing. Expect to be approved and published in 2nd quarter FY 07. Major changes include: implementation of a more frequent self-inspection process, conducting additional key word searches on N-NC computer systems, defining several nebulous terms used in the current implementing regulations, and increasing the depth of IO training within the command.

5. Other pertinent IO actions:

N-NC IG is still awaiting a close-out letter from ATSD(IO) reference the Procedure 15 Investigation conducted on JFHQ-NCR/MDW during 3rd QTR 06. Any assistance the Joint Staff IG office can provide in this matter is appreciated.

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Visit Summary

General: The NORAD-USNORTHCOM (N-NC) Inspector General conducted an Intelligence Oversight (IO) Re-Inspection of Joint Force Headquarters National Capital Region, Military District of Washington (JFHQ-NCR/MDW), Fort McNair, DC, on 5 December 2006, which consists of members of the US Navy, US Air Force, USMC, and the US Army as well as government civilian personnel and contractors. The J32 is organized under the J3 in the command, and works very closely with the J34 in the production and dissemination of daily and weekly Threat Briefs and Intelligence Updates.

The purpose of the visit was to ensure compliance with all Federal and DoD directives, capture best practices, and review/discuss the corrective actions taken to correct weaknesses or deficiencies identified during the previous inspection (August 2006). The inspection team consisted of Mr. Scott Southard, Intelligence Oversight Officer for NORAD-USNORTHCOM IG.

(b)(6)JFHQ-NCR/MDW Deputy J32, hosted the inspection team. After introductions b(4) and a presentation of objectives to the Chief of Staff (b)(6) , the inspection began.

After an Initial inspection of the IO Program Continuity Book, an inspection of computer tiles was conducted on drives assigned to the J32 (Intelligence) shop.

Good accountability and integration of Law Enforcement Sensitive (LES) and other U.S. Persons information was demonstrated throughout the IO Inspection. The confusion and misunderstanding of the requirements and constraints involved in the storage, marking, and fusion of U.S. Persons information displayed during the last inspection was no longer present. It was apparent that a good awareness of the legal constraints involved in IO/Sensitive Data permeated the command, and that a focused training regimen was being conducted on a frequent basis.

1. Program Book - Satisfactory

1.1. IO Pubs/Directives - Satisfactory

NOTABLES

- Although not required by current regulation to generate their own Operating Instruction
 (OI), the J32 generated, and have been using an outstanding OI that they created.
 The use of this detailed local J32 Operating Instruction will help to ensure the standardization of daily operating procedures and activities within the command. This standardization will help avert a possible IO violation or incident in the future.
- Additional documents were included in the unit's IO books that will facilitate an efficient and detailed IO Program If used (various memorandums, slide presentations, and point papers on IO topics).

1.2. Training Records - Satisfactory

AREA FOR IMPROVEMENT

Currently, the training records simply consist of a "sign in sheet" from the training session. Although this does provide the names of the persons involved in training, it does not allow the tracking of those that did not attend, or the annotation of why individuals are not trained. It was suggested that an Excel spreadsheet be used to maintain the training information (or better yet, have additional columns placed on a spreadsheet already being used in the command, i.e. one already in use by the J1).

1.3. Appointment Orders - Satisfactory

NOTABLE

 Numerous flyers that denote the Intelligence Oversight Officer (iOO) for the command were readily visible in conspicuous places throughout the area. Not only were the primary and alternate IOOs contact information included, but also their pictures. These flyers will enhance the availability of the IOO to personnel within the unit.

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2. Training Program - Satisfactory

COMMENDABLE

A very robust training plan is in place for the analysts. During the in-processing of new personnel IO/Sensitive Data training is required as part of the in-processing checklist. Furthermore, before the analyst is issued their permanent access badge they must show proof of their IO/Sensitive Data training to the badging authority. As part of the internal J32 training, the analysts must take a written test and pass it with an 80% grade or higher. They also incorporate an interactive question and answer period in their training sessions, utilizing common examples of the types of information that they routinely handle/see. (OPR: J32, (b)(6)

3. Self Inspection - Satisfactory

COMMENDABLE

The J32 has implemented a very strong "Self Inspection" program. They currently conduct self-inspections weekly, as well as every 30, 60, and 90 days. This frequent schedule will help ensure U.S. Persons information will not be maintained longer then allowed by current directives (if it meets the required caveats). They also have a minimum of two people conducting each level of self inspection, providing for a dual filter of all data being collected, used, and maintained. (OPR: J32, (b)(6) Du) (b)(6)

NOTABLE

Information kept on the J32 shared drive was kept to an absolute minimum. This not only makes it much easier to conduct self-inspections, but also minimizes the risk of questionable or offending data being overlooked. Data stored on individual harddrives was almost non-existent as well.

JA Involvement – Satisfactory

COMMENDABLE

The J32 - JA relationship has become extremely strong. Throughout the inspection it was clear to the inspection team that J32 - JA personnel currently have a robust relationship, and that this allows the analysts to utilize available expertise and make informed IO decisions. The command has also implemented a Sensitive information Working Group (SIWG). This group consists of J32, JA, and J34 personnel, and meets on a monthly basis, or more often as required. The purpose of the SIWG is to ensure compliance with all applicable rules, regulations and laws in regards to IO and Sensitive Data handling. (OPR: J32, (b)(6)

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AREA FOR IMPROVEMENT

Currently there are no minutes kept during the SIWGs. It was suggested that the J32
begin to keep minutes of all future meetings. This will not only provide for a historic
record, but also assist in the tracking of any taskers that develop during the meetings.

In each organization, the IG found effective IO training programs, to include initial indoctrination training and recurring refresher training.

The reason this was the first time for these inspections is because these organizations are relatively new and we wanted to allow them to establish their IO programs before inspecting them. SUBJECT: 1st QUARTER, FY07, Intelligence Oversight (IO) Inspection Report

- 1. The USTRANSCOM Inspector General (TCIG) conducted a quarterly review of USTRANSCOM IO programs. There were no questionable activities or violations reported this quarter.
- 2. There are three distinct elements which provide intelligence support within the **USTRANSCOM** headquarters:
 - a. Inteligence Directorate (TCJ2)
 - b. Joint Transportation Reserve Unit (JTRU)
 - c. Joint Transportation Intelligence Operations Center (JIOCTRANS 0169)

TCIG conducts an annual IO inspection on each of these elements throughout the fiscal year, and coordinates with IO Program Monitors in all elements to regularly assess compliance with Federal laws and national directives regarding intelligence activities. Every element is providing excellent Intelligence Oversight training, and all personnel assigned have demonstrated a sound understanding of the policies and reporting requirements. No deficiencies or questionable activities were noted in any of the IO programs inspected.

- 3. Most government service civillan personnel assigned to the intelligence elements at USTRANSCOM will become Defense Intelligence Agency (DIA) employees in the near future. TCIG has already contacted DIA/IG to discuss the possibility of conducting "joint" 10 inspections in the future. In FY07 TCIG will update the current USTRANSCOM Intelligence Oversight Program Instruction to incorporate any changes in element command structure and CJCSI 5901. Currently, there have been no changes to the command IO activities, directives, or training program.

Subject: Intelligence Oversight (IO) Report for First Quarter, FY08

- 1. Below is a consolidated summary of all Combatant Commands (COCOMs) Intelligence Oversight (IO) Reports for the First Quarter, FY08. Attached are all COCOM reports. Also, Service Components will report IO information through their Service.
- a) USCENTCOM IG: Augmentation forces for Operation ENDURING FREEDOM assigned to USCENTCOM at Mac Dill AFB are receiving initial intelligence oversight training. There were no questionable activities reported.
- b) **USEUCOM IG:** Intelligence oversight training included 103 initial and 133 refresher briefings.

One questionable activity was reported by US Army Europe for information purposes. US Army Europe is currently performing a Proc 15 inquiry. They will report results through their Service intel oversight channels with info copy to USEUCOM J2.

Internal assessments were conducted by EUCOM J2, SHAPE Survey, USNIC-Pristina, Northern Region JOIC, Southern Region JOIC, Joint Analysis Center, Special Operations Command and Europe. 232 personnel were interviewed.

EUCOM IG inspected the Joint Analysis Center in Molesworth, United Kingdom on October 2007 and Special Operations Command Europe on December 2007, as part of a larger command inspection of SOCEUR by the Special Operations Command IG. There were no findings in either program. Three observations were made by the EUCOM IG to the JAC.

The training programs of both organizations were within standards. SOCEUR noted by EUCOM for a best practice IO training program.

EUCOM IG attended the NORTHCOM/NORAD IO Conference from 3-6 Dec 07 at Ft Bliss, TX.

c) **USJFCOM IG:** USJFCOM J2 conducted a self-inspection of allintelligence holdings for US persons' data, including items posted to command home pages, hard-copy files, proper use statements and archived imagery. All holdings were found to be within IO regulations.

The USJFCOM IG's office conducted a unit command inspection of the Joint Warfighting Center in Suffolk, Virginia from 22-26 October 2007 and the Joint Transformation Command Intelligence in Norfolk, Virginia from 10-14 December 2007. Both inspections included intelligence oversight. Both commands were found in compliance with all appropriate regulations and maintained accurate training records for the command's intelligence oversight programs.

d) USNORTHCOM IG: The N-NC IG, completed Intelligence Oversight Inspections of JTF-N, NORAD and USNORTHCOM J2. The organizations were well versed in their duties and responsibilities, understanding constitutional constraints, and laws and directives which govern the collection, dissemination and storage of sensitive information, especially that data which is constrained by Intelligence Oversight guidance or acquired on non-DoD persons. Their programs are very strong with only minor recommendations for improvement. One subordinate command (AFNORTH) did not submit their quarterly report at this time. An addendum will be submitted when the report is received.

All N-NC Intelligence Directorates and subordinate commands have conducted initial and refresher training for personnel. 99% of personnel have been trained. All efforts will be made to maintain/increase the level.

N-NC updated the command IO Instruction (NNCI-14-103). This instruction has been put into effect and changes in the new guidance will be highlighted during upcoming IO Inspections.

All N-NC Intelligence Directorates and JTPs have implemented more frequent database information review processes (30-60 days) to ensure data repositories have effective follow-up assessments concerning the need to retain information.

The first world wide IO Conference sponsored by USNORTHCOM took place at JTF-N Headquarters in El Paso, TX from 4 Dec to 6 Dec 07. Over 50 IO specialists representing the Joint Staff, COCOMs, DoD, Interagency and N-NC Subordinate partners participated.

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- e) USPACOM IG: Annual training is being conducted via computer with certificates being sent to the IO coordinator. New members are still receiving inperson indoctrination training.
- f) USSOUTHCOM IG: Automated training notifications go out monthly as a reminder to all personnel who are required to undergo training during that month. Joint Task Force Bravo (JTF Bravo), Special Operation Command South (SOCSO-JZ), Joint Interagency Task Force-South (JIATF-S J2 CI), and Joint Task Force, Guantanamo Bay, Cuba (JTF-GTMO) submitted negative reports on any IO violations. Special Operation Command South (SOCSO-JZ) continues to provide IO training and current resource materials to designated intelligence personnel on a regular basis. Joint Interagency Task Force-South (JIATF-S J2 CI) training of new personnel assigned to intelligence activities are monitoring the JIATF-S WebTas Program to insure US persons data meets authorized retainability under JIATF-S mission, allowing for collection of information regarding drug trafficking. Reviewed all US persons in WebTas and either eliminated or left them in because of sustaining information. The database is current with known traffickers and persons with prior criminal history.
- g) USSOCOM IG: Conducted three IO inspections, these inspections included HQ USSOCOM at MacDill AFB, Special Operations Command Pacific at Camp Smith, HI (joint inspection with PACOM IG), and Special Operations Command Europe at Patch Barracks, GE (joint inspection with EUCOM IG). There were no questionable intelligence activities discovered during the inspections. There were sufficient Intelligence Oversight Programs in place. Personnel were familiar with the intelligence oversight requirements and were compliant with the laws, regulations, policies and procedures pertaining to intelligence oversight.

USSOCOM-SCSO-J2 continues to operate the Intelligence Oversight Training Program through a computer based program. No changes to that program have occurred.

h) USSTRATCOM IG: Inspected three IO programs this quarter, USSTRATCOM J2, Intelligence Directorate, Joint Functional Component Command (JFCC) Global Strike and Integration (GSI) J2, Intelligence Directorate and Joint Information Operations Warfare Command (JIOWC) in Lackland AFB, TX. There were no questionable intelligence activity at any of these organizations. The IO programs inspected at USSTRATCOM J2 and JFCC GSI J2 were noted as excellent. The IO program at the JIOWC was satisfactory. There were some administrative deficiencies (out of date IO references and lack of training documentation) that detracted from the

JOIWC's program. All three IO programs are meeting DoD IO program requirements and all personnel interviewed were well aware of the requirements of the DoD IO program. The IO training programs in these organizations were sound and met the needs of the organizations, personnel and DoD.

- i) USTRANSCOM IG (TCIG): Conducted a quarterly review of command IO programs to assess compliance with Federal laws and national directives regarding intelligence activities. There were no questionable activities or violations reported this quarter.



- (b) Many personnel did not understand that a "questionable activity," as defined by Procedure 15, concerns any "conduct that constitutes, or is related to, an intelligence activity that may violate the law, any Executive order or Presidential directive.... Most personnel still believe that questionable activity refers only to matters involving US persons.
- (c) The JAC needs to bring the six Joint Reserve Intelligence Support Element (JRISE) centers in CONUS under the JAC's intel oversight umbrella.
 - (3) Questionable intelligence activities discovered: None.
- (4) Familiarity of personnel with intelligence oversight requirements: Personnel showed adequate evidence of basic knowledge of intel oversight as a result of their initial and refresher training.
- (5) Adequacy of organization intelligence oversight training program: The training programs of both organizations were within standards. SOCEUR uses an excellent white paper as a basis for establishing left-right limits for its deployed personnel and also as an information aid for its senior leaders.

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

- 1. There were no intelligence, counterintelligence, or intelligence-related violations of law, regulation, or policy in USSTRATCOM this quarter.
- 2. During this quarter, the IG inspected three IO programs: 1) USSTRATCOM J2, Intelligence Directorate, 2) Joint Functional Component Command (JFCC) Global Strike and Integration (GSI) J2, Intelligence Directorate, and 3) Joint Information Operations Wariare Command (JIOWC), Lackland AFB, TX. There was no questionable intelligence activity at any of these organizations. The IO programs in USSTRATCOM J2 and JFCC GSI J2 are excellent. The IO program at the JIOWC is satisfactory. There were some administrative deficiencies (out of date IO references and lack of training documentation) that detracted from the JIOWC's program. All three IO programs are meeting DoD IO program requirements and all personnel interviewed were well aware of the requirements of the DoD IO program. The IO training programs in these organizations are sound and most the needs of the organizations' personnel and DoD. Lastly, the IO oversight and processes at these three organizations are meeting the requirements of DoD.

- 4. There were no changes to USSTRATCOM IO directives or policies concerning intelligence or intelligence-related activities during this period.

Subject: Intelligence Oversight (IO) Report for Fourth Quarter, FY07

- 1. Below is a consolidated summary of all Combatant Commands (COCOMs) Intelligence Oversight (IO) Reports for the Fourth Quarter, FY07. Attached are all COCOM reports with further information. Also, Service Components will report IO information through their Service.
- a) USCENTCOM IG: Augmentation forces for Operation ENDURING FREEDOM assigned to USCENTCOM at Mac Dill AFB are receiving initial intelligence oversight training. There were no questionable activities reported.
- b) USEUCOM IG: Intelligence oversight training included 154 initial and 343 refresher briefings. Internal assessments were conducted by EUCOM J2, SHAPE, Survey, USNIC-Pristina, USNIC-Sarajevo, Special Operations Command, Europe (SOCEUR, Joint Analysis Center (JAC) and there were 343 personnel interviewed.

EUCOM IG will inspect the Joint Analysis Center, Molesworth, United Kingdom, teaming with the Asst IG for IO, Defense Intelligence Agency, in late October 2007.

c) USJFCOM IG: Conducted a staff assistance visit (SAV) at the request of Standing Joint Force Headquarters (SJFHQ) from 10-14 September 2007 and determined that, the intelligence officer demonstrated a clear understanding of all regulations related to IO and had solid control measures in place to ensure compliance.

The USJFCOM IG's office also conducted a unit command inspection of the Joint Warfighting Center in Suffolk, Virginia from 23-27 July 2007 that included intelligence oversight. The intelligence officer, was in compliance with all appropriate regulations and maintained accurate training records for the command's IO program.

d) USNORTHCOM IG: The N-NC IG, completed IO Inspections at JTF-AK and JTF-CS. The organizations were well versed in their duties and

responsibilities, understanding constitutional constraints the laws and directives which govern the collection, dissemination and storage of sensitive information, especially the data this is constrained by IO guidance or acquired on non-DOD persons. Their programs are very strong with only minor recommendations for improvement.

All N-NC Intelligence Directorates and subordinate commands have conducted initial and refresher training for personnel. 99% of personnel have been trained in the command and all efforts will be made to maintain/increase the level.

N-NC has also updated and disseminated the command IO Instruction (NNCI-14-103). This instruction has been implemented and changed, new guidance will be highlighted during upcoming IO Inspections.

All N-NC Intelligence Directorates and JTFs have implemented more frequent database information review processes (30-60 day reviews) to ensure data repositories have effective follow-up assessments concerning the need to retain information.

- e) USPACOM IG: Annual training is being conducted via computer with certificates being sent to IO coordinator, new members are still receiving inperson indoctrination training. ALCOM computer drives are being reconfigured. All reporting commands are conducting indoctrination and refresher training. N-NC IG Procedure 15 investigation into potential JTF-AK-IO violations is in progress as an outcome of their inspection of ALCOM/JTF-AK J2 conducted on 6-8 March 07. Final report from N-NC is forthcoming.
- f) USSOUTHCOM IG: Automated fraining notifications go out monthly as a reminder to all personnel who are required to undergo training during that month. Joint Task Force Bravo (JTF Bravo), Special Operation Command South (SOCSO-J2), Joint Interagency Task Force-South (JIATF-S J2 Cl), and Joint Task Force, Guantanamo Bay, Cuba (JTF-GTMO) all submitted a negative report to any IO violations.
- g) USSOCOM IG: There were no IO inspections conducted during this quarter.
- h) USSTRATCOM IG: There were no IO inspections conducted during this quarter. USSTRATCOM IG had an IO inspection scheduled at the Joint Information Operations Warfare Command (JIOWC), Lackland AFB, but had to postpone due to other Command priorities. The IO inspection will be rescheduled, as well as scheduling other units' IO inspections, as soon as priorities allow.

The USSTRATCOM Instruction 919-3, Intelligence Oversight Inspection

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Program, has been revised.

- i) USTRANSCOM IG (TCIG): Conducted the USTRANSCOM quarterly IO program inspection of the Joint Reserve Directorate (TCJ9)/Joint Transportation Reserve Unit (JTRU), in coordination with the JTRU IO Program Monitor on 8 September 07. The inspection consisted of a review of IO program administration, to include required initial/annual IO training of TCJ9/JTRU personnel, and an evaluation of the effectiveness of that IO training. 100% of assigned personnel are trained, and all personnel who were evaluated demonstrated appropriate knowledge of IO regulations and procedures. Two JTRU personnel are currently deployed from the unit, but they have completed annual IO refresher training.



- a) USCENTCOM IG: Augmentation forces for Operation ENDURING FREEDOM assigned to USCENTCOM at Mac Dill AFB are receiving initial intelligence oversight training. There were no questionable intelligence activities reported.
- b) USEUCOM IG: Intelligence oversight training included 64 initial and 92 refresher briefings. Internal assessments were conducted by EUCOM J2, Survey SHAPE, USNIC-Pristina, USNIC-Sarajevo, Northern Region JOIC. Southern Region JOIC, Joint Analysis Center. Total of 293 personnel interviewed. No questionable intelligence activities reported. The EUCOM IG received an information copy of a possible Procedure 15 but further investigation determined an error. The EUCOM IG received a revision of the USEUCOM Intelligence Oversight staff memorandum, and it should be published during the third quarter.
- c) USJFCOM IG: J2 established computer-based IO awareness training on each SIPRNET computer. This IO awareness training is also available on the unclassified JFCOM portal in IRIS. The J2 tracks employee training completion in IRIS. The USJFCOM IG's Office conducted a unit command inspection of Special Operations Command Joint Forces Command (SOCJFCOM) and was found to be in compliance with all applicable regulations.

The J7 conducted a review of exercises planned for the 3^{-1} quarter/FY07. and identified one exercise required the use of domestic commercial imagery. A review of legal and policy constraints governing the use of commercial imagery was initiated.

- d) USNORTHCOM: The N-NC IG completed IO Inspections of JTF-AK that resulted procedural problems pertaining to the development and dissemination of intelligence products containing US persons information, a Procedure 15 investigation was conducted. The JTF-AK J2 will be responsible for submitting Corrective Action Reports NLT 30 April 2007. The N-NC/J2 reported one incident this quarter, possibly contrary to Executive Order or Department of Defense directives. The N-NC IG hosted a visit from the ATSD(IO), and the inspectors conducted IO inspections of the N-NC/J2 and SJFHQ-N. The N-NC has updated and disseminated the command IO Instruction (NNCI-14-1403). All N-NC Intelligence Directorates and JTF's have conducted initial and refresher training for personnel, 98% has been trained.
- e) USPACOM IG: Two possible IO violations were reported at ALCOM during an inspection conducted N-NC IG. JTF-AK J2 received an overall N-NC IG inspection grade of "Unsatisfactory" due to annual training being conducted via computer with certificates being sent to IO coordinator. New personnel receive in-person indoctrination training. ALCOM computer drives are being reconfigured. All reporting commands are conducting indoctrination and refresher training.
- f) USSOUTHCOM IG: Automated training notifications go out monthly as a reminder to all personnel who are required to undergo training during that month. Joint Task Force Bravo (JTF Bravo), Special Operation Command South (SOCSO-J2), Joint Interagency Task Force-South (JIATF-S J2 CI), and Joint Task Force, Guantanamo Bay, Cuba (JTF-GTMO) submitted a negative reports for questionable intelligence activities.
- g) **USSOCOM IG:** There were no IO inspections conducted during this quarter. No questionable intelligence violations were reported.
- h] **USSTRATCOM IG:** USSTRATCOM IG inspected the IO program at the Global Innovation and Strategy Center (GISC). GISC's IO program was found to be satisfactory. No questionable intelligence activity was identified.

The N-NC IG conducted an Intelligence Oversight (IO) Inspection of JTF-AK from 6-8 March that resulted in the identification of procedural problems pertaining to the development and dissemination of intelligence products containing US Persons information. A determination was made that a Procedure 15 Investigation was required. Details of the Inspection are contained in N-NC Intelligence Oversight inspection report, IO Inspection 07-03. In response to the inspection report, the JTF-AK J2 will be responsible for submitting two Corrective Action Reports NLT 30 April 2007.

b. The N-NC J2 reported that there was one Incident this quarter possibly contrary to Executive Order or Department of Defense directives concerned with intelligence oversight. On 25 Jan 07, watch notes distributed via small by the N-NC/J2 Operational Intelligence Watch (OfW) contained an FBI IIR which referred to two USPER organizations by name. The IIR was one of many from various information feeds into the OfW and was inadvertently distributed to a small group of analysts without having been reviewed by the watch officer. Concerns were raised by the N-NC/J2 shortly after the watch notes were distributed and immediate action was taken to make appropriate notification to recipients to destroy the watch notes. All electronic and hard copies of the IIR were purged from the Officers on the importance of reviewing items included in distributed watch notes with a close eye on intelligence oversight concerns.

2. Significant Intelligence Oversight Activities

a. The N-NC IG conducted an IO Inspection of JTF-AK from 6-8 March 2007.

This N-NC IG also hosted a visit by (b)(6) and (b)(6) from the ATSD(IO).

During the visit the ATSD(IO) inspectors conducted IO Inspections of the N-NC J2, and SJFHQ-N. All subordinate commands inspected by ATSD(IO) were well versed in their duties and responsibilities, understanding constitutional constraints, and the

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

- 1. There were no intelligence, counterintelligence, or intelligence related violations of law, regulation, or policy in USSTRATCOM this quarter.
- During this quarter, the IG inspected the IQ program at the Global Innovation and Strategy Center (GISC). This was the first 10 program inspection at the GISC which began operation in June 2006. The GISC IO program is satisfactorily meeting the requirements of the DoD IO program. There was no questionable intelligence activity at the GISC. The personnel interviewed during the inspection displayed an understanding of the DoD IO program requirements. The IO training program meets DoD requirements, however, emprovement as necessary. The IG made two recommendations in the inspection report to the GISC Director. The IG recommended that the GISC IO program monitor be included in the GISC in-processing procedure for inbound personnel to ensure those requiring initial IO indoorination training receive it upon their arrival. The IG also recommended that the IO program moment develop a formal IO refresher training program to ensure all personnel receive annual training and that the training is documented. These recommendations are being implemented by the GISC IO program monitor.
- 3. There were no changes to USSTRATCOM directives or policies relating to intelligence, counterintelligence, or intelligence-related activities. We are revising and updating our USSTRATCOM Operating Instruction concerning IO program management. We will provide you a copy of the instruction as soon as it is published. (W/K)

- 1. The USTRANSCOM Inspector General (TCIG) conducted a quarterly review of USTRANSCOM 10 programs to assess compliance with Federal laws and national directives regarding intelligence activities. There were no questionable activities or violations reported this quarter.
- 2. In addition, CAPT Brad Carpenter, USTRANSCOM Inspector General (TCIG), and (b)(6) USTRANSCOM Chiel, Civil and Fiscal Law (TCIA), specifically conducted an IO program respection of the Naval Reserve Intelligence Unit, Joint Operations Intelligence Center USTRANSCOM (JIOCTRANS 0169) on 03 Feb 07.
- 3. The JIOCTRANS inspection consisted of a review of the unit IO program administration, to include documentation of annual IO training and an evaluation of the effectiveness of that training (tarough testing and interviews). 100% of available JIOCTRANS personnel received annual IO refresher training in February and March 2007. All personnel evaluated demonstrated a sound understanding of IO policies and reporting requirements. There were two JIOCTRANS personnel deployed, and one other assigned on active duty away from the unit; all three will receive annual IO refresher training upon their return.
- 4. There have been no changes to USTRANSCOM IO program activities, directives, or training programs this quarter.

- Below is a consolidated summary of all Combatant Commands (COCOMs) Intelligence Oversight (IO) Reports for the Third Quarter, FY-07. Attached are all COCOM reports for further information. Also Service Components will report IO information through their Service.
- a) USCENTCOM IG: Augmentation forces for Operation ENDURING FREEDOM assigned to USCENTCOM at Mac Dill AFB are receiving initial intelligence oversight training. There were no questionable activities reported.
- b) USEUCOM IO: Intelligence oversight training included 192 initial and 103 refresher briefings. Internal assessments were conducted by EUCOM J2, on SHAPE Survey, USNIC-Pristina, USNIC-Sarajevo, Northern Region JOIC, Southern Region JOIC, and the Joint Analysis Center and there were 278 personnel interviewed.

The EUCOM IG conducted a Staff Assistance Visit of the US National Intelligence Cell-Pristina, Kosovo to acclimate the new intelligence oversight training officer. There were no major discrepancies found in the course of records reviews and interviews with watch personnel. One common finding was that even experienced personnel believe that a questionable activity relates only to information concerning US persons, and not to intelligence professional misconduct. This is a systemic weakness in training that the intelligence officer is working on.

EUCOM IG will meet with ATSD(IO) inspectors following their assessment of Special Operations Command, Europe on 16 July 2007.

c) USJFCOM IG: J9 OPSEC Coordinator received a briefing from the National Geospatial Intelligence Agency on the NGA processes for compliance with DOD's Intelligence Oversight Requirements regarding the "Proper use Memorandum for Domestic Imagery. The briefing was presented as part of the OPSEC Coordinator training program.

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USJSCOM IG conducted a unit command inspection of the Joint Personnel Recovery Agency (JPRA) at Fort Belvoir, Virginia from 23-27 April 2007 that included IO. JPRA's IO office was in compliance with all regulations.

- d) USNORTHCOM: The N-NC IG in conjunction with ATSD(IO), completed IO Inspections of the N-NC J2, SJFHQ-N, and JTF-N. The organizations were well versed in their duties and responsibilities, understanding constitutional constraints, and the laws and directives which govern the collection, dissemination and storage of sensitive information, especially that data which is constrained by IO guidance or acquired on non-DOD persons. N-NC has updated and disseminated the command IO Instruction (NNCI-14-103). All N-NC Intelligence Directorates and subordinate commands have conducted initial and refresher training at 99%. N-NC has also updated and disseminated the command IO instruction (NNCI-14-103).
- e) USPACOM IG: JTF-AK J2 overall N-NC IG inspection grade of "unsatisfactory" due to potential IO violation. Annual training is being conducted via computer with certificates being sent to IO coordinator while new members continue receiving in-person indoctrination training. ALCOM Procedure 15 inquiry, inspection is scheduled to be completed during the N-NC IG re-inspection.
- f) USSOUTHCOM IG: Automated training notifications go out monthly as a reminder to all personnel who are required to undergo training during that month. Joint Task Force Bravo (JTF Bravo), Special Operation Command South (SOCSO-J2), Joint Interagency Task Force-South (JIATF-S J2 C), and Joint Task Force, Guantanamo Bay, Cuba (JTF-GTMO) all submitted a negative report to any IO violations.
- g) USSOCOM IG: There were no IO inspections of violation reported during this quarter.
- h) **USSTRATCOM IG:** USSTRATCOM IG inspected the IO programs at Joint Functional Component Command-Integrated Missile Defense (JFCC-IMD) and the Joint Functional Component Command-Intelligence, Surveillance and Reconnaissance (JFCC-ISR). JFCC-IMD and JFCC-ISR programs were found to be excellent. No questionable intelligence activity was identified.
- i) USTRANSCOM IG: USTRANSCOM IG and USTRANSCOM Chief, Civil and Fiscal Law (TCJA), conducted an IO program inspection of the USTRANSCOM Joint Intelligence Operation Center in coordination with the TCJ2 IO Program Monitor. The inspection consisted of a review of TCJ2 IO program administration, to include documentation of annual IO training and an evaluation of the effectiveness of that training. 96% of TCJ2 personnel had received initial or annual IO refresher training. Nine remaining personnel were scheduled to complete IO training within 60 days following the inspection. All

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personnel evaluated during the inspection demonstrated a sound understanding of IO policies and the requirements for reporting questionable intelligence activities.

Subject: Intelligence Oversight (IO) Report for the period of Apr - Jun 2007

- I. There were no intelligence, counterintelligence, or intelligence-related violations of law, regulation, or policy in USSTRATCOM this quarter.
- 2. During this quarter, the IG inspected the IO programs at Joint Functional Component Command-Integrated Missile Defense (JFCC-IMD) and the Joint Functional Component Command-Integligence, Surveillance and Reconnaissance (JFCC-ISR). This was the first time the IG conducted inspections at these two JFCCs since they stood up in calendar year 2005 (b)(6) (b)(6) (OSD ATSD-IO, observed the USSTRATCOM IG inspector conduct the inspection at JFCC-ISR as part of the upcoming IO program inspection at USSTRATCOM. Both of these commands have excellent IO programs and are meeting all of the requirements of the DoD IO program. There was no questionable intelligence activity at either JFCC-IMD or JFCC-ISR. The personnel interviewed during these inspections displayed outstanding understanding of the DoD IO program requirements. In addition, the IO training programs at these commands, to include initial indoctrination and recurring refresher training, satisfy all DoD requirements and are effectively meeting the IO needs of the USSTRATCOM personnel assigned there. In surmary, the IO programs at JFCC-IMD and JFCC-ISR are excellent, and fully support the DoD IO program.
- 3. There were no changes to the USSTRATCOM IO inspection program.
- 4. There were no changes to USSTRATCOM directives or policies relating to intelligence, counterintelligence, or intelligence-related activities. We are currently revising our USSTRATCOM Operating Instruction concerning IO inspection program management. We will provide you a copy of the instruction as soon as it is published.

- The USTRANSCOM inspector General (TCIG) conducted a quarterly review of USTRANSCOM IO programs to assess compliance with Federal taws and national directives regarding intelligence activities. There were no questionable activities or violations reported this quarter.
- 2. In addition, CAPT Brad Carpenter, USTRANSCOM Inspector General (TCIG), and (b)(6). Chief, Civil and Fiscal Law, Office of the Statt Judge Advocate (TCJA), conducted an IO program inspection of the USTRANSCOM Joint Intelligence Operation Center in coordination with the TCJ2 IO Program Monitor on 15 May 2007.
- 3. The inspection consisted of a review of TCJ2 IO program administration, to include documentation of annual IO training and an evaluation of the effectiveness of that training. As of 15 May 2007, 96% of TCJ2 personnel had received initial or annual iO refresher training for 2007. Nine (9) remaining personnel were scheduled to complete IO training within 60 days following the inspection. All personnel evaluated during the inspection demonstrated a sound understanding of IO policies and the requirements for reporting questionable intelligence activities.
- 4. There have been no changes to USTRANSCOM to program activities, directives, or training programs this quarter.

Subject: Intelligence Oversight (IO) Report for Second Quarter, FY08

- Below is a consolidated summary of all Combatant Commands (COCOMs) Intelligence Oversight (IO) Reports for the Second Quarter, FY08. Attached are all COCOM reports with further information. Service Component IGs will report IO information to their Service.
- a) USCENTCOM IG: Augmentation forces for Operation ENDURING FREEDOM assigned to USCENTCOM at Mac Dill AFB are receiving initial intelligence oversight training. There were no questionable activities reported.
- b) **USEUCOM IG:** Intelligence oversight training included 105 initial and 191 refresher briefings.

Internal assessments were conducted by EUCOM J2, SHAPE Survey, USNIC-Pristma, Northern Region JOIC, Southern Region JOIC, Joint Analysis Center, Special Operations Command, Europe and there were 141 personnel interviewed.

c) USJFCOM IG: USJFCOM J2 conducted a self-inspection of all intelligence holdings for US persons' data, including items posted to command home pages, hard-copy files, proper use statements and archived imagery. All holdings were found to be within IO regulations.

The Joint Personnel Recovery Agency (JPRA) Intelligence Directorate is cooperating with the Federal Bureau of Investigation on the Global Hostage-Taking Research and Analysis Project managed by the FBI's Behavioral Science Unit. Cooperation for this is established within the limits set by DOD 5240.1-Ŕ.

The USJFCOM IG's office conducted a unit command inspection of the Joint Fires Integration and Interoperability Team (JFIIT) in Elgin, Florida from 28 January to 1 February 2008. JFIIT was found to be in compliance with all appropriate regulations and maintained accurate training records for the command's intelligence oversight programs.

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
